7 conditions and limitations:

8 (1) \$288,000 of the general fund--state appropriation is provided
9 solely for the legislative budget committee to conduct a performance
10 audit of the office of the superintendent of public instruction and
11 report its finding to the appropriate committees of the legislature by
12 December 31, 1995. In addition to the standard items reviewed in a
13 performance audit, the committee is directed to provide the following:
14 (a) A determination of methods to maximize the amount of federal funds
15 received by the state; (b) the identification of potential cost savings
16 from any office programs which could be eliminated or transferred to
17 the private sector; (c) an analysis of gaps and overlaps in office
18 programs; and (d) an evaluation of the efficiency with which the office
19 of the superintendent of public instruction operates the programs under
20 its jurisdiction and fulfills the duties assigned to it by law. In
21 conducting the performance audit, the legislative budget committee is
22 also directed to use performance measures or standards used by other
23 states or other large education organizations in developing its
24 findings.

25 (2) The general fund--state appropriation contains sufficient funds
26 for the legislative budget committee to perform the study required in
27 Second Substitute Senate Bill No. 5574 regarding the transfer of forest
28 board lands to the counties.

29 (3) \$89,000 of the general fund--state appropriation and \$89,000 of
30 the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to
31 implement Fourth Substitute House Bill No. 1481 (AFDC contracts). If
32 the bill is not enacted by June 30, 1996, the amount provided in this
33 subsection shall lapse.

34 (4) \$75,000 of the general fund--state appropriation in this
35 section is provided solely for implementation of Second Substitute
36 House Bill No. 2222 (performance audits). If the bill is not enacted
37 by June 30, 1996, the amount provided in this subsection shall lapse.

38 (5) The legislative budget committee shall study staffing models
39 and staff deployment at the juvenile rehabilitation facilities operated

1 by the department of social and health services at Maple Lane, Green
2 Hill, and Echo Glen. The study shall include: (i) A comparison of
3 current staffing levels between each institution by type of living
4 unit; (ii) staffing levels contemplated for new living units slated for
5 occupancy in the 1997-99 biennium; (iii) analysis of the staffing level
6 drivers, including programming, facilities design, and security
7 requirements; (iv) a methodology for estimating the costs or savings
8 associated with changes to institutional populations, with
9 recommendations concerning the appropriate use of average and marginal
10 costs; and (v) the costs and benefits of decommissioning older living
11 units as new living units come on line. The findings shall be reported
12 to the appropriate committees of the legislature by December 20, 1996.

13 (6) The legislative budget committee shall study the extent and
14 uses of supplemental salaries for K-12 certificated staff. In
15 conducting the study, the committee shall consult with the legislative
16 evaluation and accountability project committee and the superintendent
17 of public instruction. Included in the information to be provided
18 shall be analysis of the extent to which supplemental salaries are
19 provided for training consistent with the skills needed once the
20 state's performance assessment system is operational. The findings
21 shall be reported to the education and fiscal committees of the
22 legislature by December 20, 1996.

23 (7) The legislative budget committee shall provide a follow-up
24 report to the study done by the legislative evaluation and
25 accountability program (LEAP) in 1995 on vocational education funding.
26 In preparing the report, the committee shall consult with LEAP. Among
27 the issues analyzed shall be changes of expenditure patterns in
28 vocational education since the 1995 study and development of a funding
29 formula that identifies more discrete funding elements than the current
30 apportionment formula. The findings shall be reported to the education
31 and fiscal committees of the legislature by December 20, 1996.

37 (16) \$500,000 of the general fund--state appropriation is provided
38 solely for distribution to the city of Burien for analysis of the
39 proposed Port of Seattle third runway including preparation of a draft

1 environmental impact statement and other technical studies. The amount
2 provided in this subsection shall not be expended directly or
3 indirectly for litigation, public relations, or any form of consulting
4 services for the purposes of opposing the construction of the proposed
5 third runway.

6 (17) Not more than \$458,000 of the general fund--state
7 appropriation may be expended for the operation of the Pacific
8 northwest export assistance project. The department will continue to
9 implement a plan for assessing fees for services provided by the
10 project. It is the intent of the legislature that the revenues raised
11 to defray the expenditures of this program will be increased to fifty
12 percent of the expenditures in fiscal year 1996 and seventy-five
13 percent of the expenditures in fiscal year 1997. Beginning in fiscal
14 year 1998, the legislature intends that this program will be fully
15 self-supporting.

16 (18) \$4,804,000 of the public safety and education account
17 appropriation is provided solely for contracts with qualified legal aid
18 programs for civil indigent legal representation pursuant to RCW
19 43.08.260. It is the intent of the legislature to ensure that legal
20 aid programs receiving funds appropriated in this act pursuant to RCW
21 43.08.260 comply with all applicable restrictions on use of these
22 funds. To this end, during the 1995-97 fiscal biennium the department
23 shall monitor compliance with the authorizing legislation, shall
24 oversee the implementation of this subsection, and shall report
25 directly to the appropriations committee of the house of
26 representatives and the ways and means committee of the senate.

27 (a) It is the intent of the legislature to improve communications
28 between legal aid programs and persons affected by the activities of
29 legal aid programs. There is established for the 1995-97 fiscal
30 biennium a task force on agricultural interests/legal aid relations.
31 The task force shall promote better understanding and cooperation
32 between agricultural interests and legal aid programs and shall provide
33 a forum for discussion of issues of common concern. The task force
34 shall not involve itself in pending litigation.

35 (i) The task force shall consist of the following sixteen members:
36 Four representatives of agricultural organizations, to be appointed by
37 the legislator members; two individuals who represent the corresponding
38 interests of legal clients, to be appointed by organizations designated
39 by the three legal services programs; two representatives of Evergreen

1 Legal Services, to be appointed by its board of directors; one
2 representative each from Puget Sound Legal Assistance Foundation and
3 Spokane Legal Services Center, each to be appointed by its directors;
4 one member from each of the majority and minority caucuses of the house
5 of representatives, to be appointed by the speaker of the house of
6 representatives; one member from each of the majority and minority
7 caucuses of the senate, to be appointed by the president of the senate;
8 and two members of the supreme court-appointed access to justice board,
9 to be appointed by the board. During fiscal year 1996, the task force
10 shall be chaired by a legislative member, to be selected by the task
11 force members. During fiscal year 1997, the committee shall be chaired
12 by a nonlegislator member, to be selected by the task force members.

13 (ii) All costs associated with the meetings shall be borne by the
14 individual task force members or by the organizations that the
15 individuals represent. No task force member shall be eligible for
16 reimbursement of expenses under RCW 43.03.050 or 43.03.060. Nothing in
17 this subsection prevents the legal aid programs from using funds
18 appropriated in this act to reimburse their representatives or the
19 individuals representing legal clients.

20 (iii) The task force will meet at least four times during the first
21 year of the biennium and as frequently as necessary thereafter at
22 mutually agreed upon times and locations. Any member of the task force
23 may place items on meeting agendas. Members present at the first two
24 task force meetings shall agree upon a format for subsequent meetings.

25 (b) The legislature recognizes that farmworkers have the right to
26 receive basic information and to consult with attorneys at farm labor
27 camps without fear of intimidation or retaliation. It is the intent of
28 the legislature and in the interest of the public to ensure the safety
29 of all persons affected by legal aid programs' farm labor camp outreach
30 activities. Legal aid program employees have the legal right to enter
31 the common areas of a labor camp or to request permission of employees
32 to enter their dwellings. Employees living in grower supplied housing
33 have the right to refuse entry to anyone including attorneys unless
34 they have a warrant. Individual employees living in employer supplied
35 housing do not have the right to force legal aid program employees to
36 leave common areas of housing (outside) as long as one person who
37 resides in the associated dwellings wants that person to be there. Any
38 legal aid program employee wishing to visit employees housed on grower
39 property has the right to enter the driveway commonly used by the

1 housing occupants. This means that if agricultural employees must use
2 a grower's personal driveway to get to their housing, legal aid program
3 employees also may use that driveway to access the housing without a
4 warrant so long as at least some of the housing is occupied. When
5 conducting outreach activities that involve entry onto labor camps,
6 legal aid programs shall establish and abide by policies regarding
7 conduct of outreach activities. The policies shall include a
8 requirement that legal aid program employees identify themselves to
9 persons whom they encounter at farm labor camps. The legal aid
10 programs shall provide copies of their current outreach policies to
11 known agricultural organizations and shall provide copies upon request
12 to any owner of property on which farmworkers are housed. Legal aid
13 program employees involved in outreach activities shall attempt to
14 inform operators of licensed farm labor camps or their agents, and
15 known grower organizations of the approximate time frame for outreach
16 activities and shall cooperate with operators of farm labor camps at
17 which farmworkers are housed in assuring compliance with all pertinent
18 laws and ordinances, including those related to trespass and
19 harassment. Employers who believe that Evergreen Legal Services
20 Outreach Guidelines have been violated shall promptly provide all
21 available information on the alleged violation to the director of
22 Evergreen Legal Services and to the chair of the Task Force on
23 Agricultural Interests/Legal Aid Relations. Evergreen Legal Services
24 will promptly investigate any alleged violations of the outreach
25 guidelines and inform the complaining party of the result. If the
26 resolution of the investigation is not satisfactory to the complainant,
27 the matter shall be placed on the Task Force agenda for discussion at
28 the next scheduled meeting. Employers who believe that Evergreen Legal
29 Services staff members have trespassed should immediately contact local
30 law enforcement authorities.

31 (c) It is the intent of the legislature to provide the greatest
32 amount of legal services to the largest number of clients by
33 discouraging inefficient use of state funding for indigent legal
34 representation. To this end, it is the intent of the legislature that,
35 prior to the commencement of litigation against any private employer
36 relating to the terms and conditions of employment legal aid programs
37 receiving funds appropriated in this act make good faith written demand
38 for the requested relief, a good faith offer of settlement or an offer
39 to submit to nonbinding arbitration prior to filing a lawsuit, unless

1 the making of the offer is, in the opinion of the director of the legal
2 services program or his/her designee, clearly prejudicial to: (i) The
3 health, safety, or security of the client; or (ii) the timely
4 availability of judicial relief. The director of the legal aid program
5 may designate not more than two persons for purposes of making the
6 determination of prejudice permitted by this section.

7 (d)(i) The legislature encourages legal aid programs to devote
8 their state and nonstate funding to the basic, daily legal needs of
9 indigent persons. No funds appropriated under this act may be used for
10 legal representation and activities outside the scope of RCW 43.08.260.

11 (ii) No funds appropriated in this act may be used for lobbying as
12 defined in RCW 43.08.260(3). Legal aid programs receiving funds
13 appropriated in this act shall comply with all restrictions on lobbying
14 contained in Federal Legal Services Corporation Act (P.L. 99-951) and

16 (e) No funds appropriated in this act may be used by legal aid
17 programs for representation of undocumented aliens.

22 attorney-client privilege, or any applicable attorney rule of
23 professional conduct. However, to the extent permitted by applicable
24 law, legal aid programs receiving funds appropriated in this act shall,
25 upon request, provide information on their activities to the department

28 (g) Nothing in this subsection is intended to limit the authority
29 of existing entities, including but not limited to the Washington state
30 bar association, the public disclosure commission, and the Federal
31 Legal Services Corporation, to resolve complaints or disputes within

34 provided solely for the delivery of services to victims of sexual
35 assault as provided for by Substitute House Bill No. 2579 (sexual abuse
36 victims). The department shall establish an interagency agreement with

38 made available under the federal victims of crime act for the purposes

18 national center in Seattle.

19 (29) The department shall work with the department of social and
20 health services to maximize federal funds to match state general funds
21 appropriated for services provided through the long-term care ombudsman
22 program. The department shall retain no more than \$25,000 of the
23 general fund--state appropriation for provision of long-term care
24 ombudsman services for program administration. If additional federal
25 funds are received, the department shall not retain any federal funding
26 for administration.
