## Dear Chief Clerk Dean and Secretary Hendrickson:

Please accept the enclosed report, submitted on behalf of the Department of Natural Resources ("Department"), as directed by the Legislature in the 2020 Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 6168. The bill directs the Department to submit monthly updates of fire suppression costs incurred, and the number and type of wildfires suppressed, to the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature.

There were 218 classified fires recorded in August 2021. Total fire cost to the department for the month of August was $\$ 30.7$ million. Estimated costs for FY 2022 are $\$ 90.3$ million as compared to the FY GFS/Disaster allotment of $\$ 28.7$ million. This puts us over the current allotment of GF-S/Disaster \& Supplemental by $\$ 61.6$ million.

Unfortunately, Washington has seen a record-breaking number of wildfires so far this season. More than 1,650 fires around the state, more than the total number of fires in all of 2020, have burned almost a half a million acres statewide.

Executive Summary for August 2022

This report summarizes Fiscal Year 2022 fire activity, actual expenditures compared to allotments.

## August

According to the EIRS Summary report, we show 218 classified fires for the month of August.

## Fire Suppression Costs For the Month of August

Total fire cost to DNR in the month of August is $\$ 30.7$ million.

## Fire Suppression Cost for Fiscal Year through August

Total fire cost for months through August is $\$ 49.8$ million.

## Estimated total costs for FY 2022 compared to FY 2022 Allotments.

Estimated costs for FY 2022 are $\$ 90.3$ million as compared to the FY GF-S/Disaster allotment of $\$ 28.7$ million. This puts us over the current allotment of GF-S/Disaster by $\$ 61.6$ million.




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## Dear Chief Clerk Dean and Secretary Hendrickson:

Please accept the enclosed revised report, submitted on behalf of the Department of Natural Resources ("Department"), as directed by the Legislature in the 2020 Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 6168. The bill directs the Department to submit monthly updates of fire suppression costs incurred, and the number and type of wildfires suppressed, to the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature.

About 300 project codes weren't captured on the original June report, totaling $\$ 1.5$ million of GFS funding. Several project codes were miscoded to PI 221 that should have been coded elsewhere, totaling $\$ .8$ million of GFS funding. Cell G63 (and K63) show the total of the two findings above, and this accounts for $\$ 2.3$ million of the unexpected overage.

In order to close this identified gap, fire business staff have met with all staff responsible for auditing the data and completing the report to review the monthly fire suppression cost manual. They've reviewed the steps to ensure that all project codes are being accounted for, and the processes for double-checking coding to minimize errors and complete corrections when necessary.

Our original June report showed us overspent by $\$ .9$ million, and the expenditures detailed above account for the other $\$ 3.6$ million overage, thus equaling the total $\$ 4.5$ million variance shown in cell G74, on our revised June report.
