

Implementation of the New Student Transportation Funding System

Summary

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) is required to provide the Washington State Legislature with quarterly updates on the progress of the implementation of the new student transportation funding system referred to as STARS (Student Transportation Allocation Reporting System). The initial distribution of funding using STARS was made February 29, 2012.

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Background

The 2010 Washington State Legislature passed Substitute House Bill 2776, which set the implementation date for STARS as September 1, 2011. The *General Instructions for Data Collection* and the *Detailed Guidance for Data Collection* are available on the OSPI website, under "STARS Reference Material" at:

The STARS system requires three reports per school year with the first due at the end of October, the second due February 1 and the third due May 1. The results of the fall and winter reports are available on OSPI's website on the STARS page referenced above, under "Quarterly Reports" and "Annual Reports."

Status Update

The regional transportation coordinators are continuing their review of submitted data and contacting district staff to resolve identified concerns. As discussion continues with school district staff, there are instances where data was not submitted in accordance with instructions. In some cases, additional clarifications regarding particular routing or reporting practices is being incorporated into the instructions.

Funding for school transportation operations during the 2011–12 school year is being distributed in accordance with the phase-in process requirements set forth in Revised Code of Washington (RCW)

28A.160.192. The initial regression analysis for determination of the coefficients used in the funding calculation for STARS was performed using the school district fall report data (student counts and school bus route information) and the reported expenditures for the 2010–11 school year. The data categories and coefficients are:

The original STARS model included two additional data elements. These were the number of kindergarten routes operated (K Route number) and the number of road miles within the school district. These two characteristics were found to not be statistically significant and were not used in the calculation of STARS funding in accordance with RCW 28A.160.192 (1)(b). OSPI will require districts to report the K Route number for the 2012–13 school year. A decision on collecting this data in the future will be made after the 2012–13 school year. Roadway miles does not require school district reporting, but OSPI will check for statistical significance again in 2012–13.

The STARS system alone does not include all the calculations necessary to determine funding levels during the phase-in period. The phase-in process was modified during the final days of the May 2011 Special Session, while the STARS system development process was just concluding. These modifications included adjustments in funding in response to legislative changes to school district employee salary and benefit funding levels and the inclusion of indirects at the federal restricted rate. These calculations were performed using Microsoft Excel. Details of the distribution of the \$2.2 million above maintenance level identified in the omnibus appropriations act is provided as an attachment to this document.

OSPI staff are continuing to work on the linear programming efficiency rating process as required by RCW 28A.160.117. In future years, STARS will export the data necessary to conduct the statistical processes (except for school district expenditure data). For this year only, data has to be manually loaded into the STARS system. The June 2012 status update will include the results of the efficiency rating system and discussion on the interpretation of those results.
