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



- \$110 million rent assistance to counties to prevent evictions through December 2020 (federal CARES Act CRF funds)
 - Estimated 30,000 households assisted
 - The purpose of this allocation is to assist low-income renters experiencing hardship related to COVID-19 for up to three months
- \$56 million in CARES Act HUD Emergency Solutions Grant
 - Estimated 7,000 households will be assisted
 - To assist people quickly regain stability in permanent supportive housing
 - \$9.7m awarded last spring; \$46.3m awarded in October.
 Two year grant (through 2022)

Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA)

- \$500 million to WA for rent assistance Implementation TBD
 - In addition to OFM and the Governor's Office, the legislature will weigh in (early action)
 - \$322 million to be administered by the state; over \$178 million direct to local communities
 - Estimated 75,000 households will be served (overlap with those previously served)
 - Administered through the U.S. Treasury Department (through December 2021)


Rent assistance: lessons learned

- Need continues to outweigh available resources for rental assistance. Without more support and added capacity for local governments, it will be challenging to get funds out quickly.
- There is a gap between the timing of federal fund availability.
 State funding would bridge this gap and could be implemented immediately.
- Data is crucial to track outcomes and equitable distributions of funds.

Unmet need for rental assistance

- Census Bureau Pulse Survey
 - December 2020: 12% of WA renters (127,329 households) are not caught up on rent payments
- Median rent in Washington is \$1,184
- Estimate of one month of unpaid rent in WA: \$151 million

- \$115 million in grants to small business over two rounds*
- \$30 million for WA State Recovery Loan Fund
- \$18 million in grants to historically disadvantaged businesses
- \$4.7 million for small business resiliency network providing culturally appropriate support to business owners

- Working WA Grants: Rounds Two and Three*
 - Round Two: \$15 million, supporting more than 1,500 businesses
 - Round Three: \$100 million, supporting approximately 8,000 businesses
- Historically disadvantaged businesses
 - \$18 million; supported 2,700 small businesses
- WA Recovery Loan Program
 - Solving a gap in the system for businesses that can't get a loan through traditional means

Small business assistance; lessons learned

- Many small business cannot access funds without technical assistance. Barriers
 include language, broadband access and experience using technology.
- Aid is needed both for businesses impacted directly by COVID restrictions and businesses impacted indirectly due to changes in consumer demand and behavior.
- Data and reporting is necessary to track outcomes and equitable distributions of funds.
- Early action legislation must take into account the resources, processes and time needed to administer program equitably and responsibly.




