ADAI small grants program: State funds

- 2-3 grant cycles/year since 1973
- Awards of 20-30K
- 400+ funded projects
- \$1 ADAI dollar | \$43.40 in external funds*

Funding comes from two sources:

- Fees from alcohol license fees (restaurants, wineries)
- Excise taxes from cannabis sales (\$ not certain)





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- ESSB 5272 no fees collected, starting April 2021
- Excise taxes from cannabis sales (\$ amount not certain)

The biennial **Healthy Youth Survey** measures the health of **adolescents in Washington**. Schools, counties, and others use this information to guide policy and programs that serve youth. According to the 2018 survey, **marijuana use among Washington teens** has remained steady at levels similar to the national rates since 2010, despite the changing landscape of legalized marijuana in our state.

Although use of marijuana has not changed significantly in the last several years, youth **attitudes towards marijuana** moved toward greater acceptance, both nationally and in Washington State.

The good news is that **parents are the primary influence on adolescent behavior** — even if it may not always seem that way. Here are some resources that can help parents discuss the use of marijuana with their children.
