EFFECT:

- Removes \$6 million from the Administrative Office of the Court for grants to superior courts for excess court-related expenditures related to implementing the *State v. Blake* decision.
- Funding is provided for the Department of Commerce to assist counties with costs of resentencing and vacating the sentences of defendants whose convictions or sentences are affected by the *State v. Blake* decision.
- Creates a legal financial obligation aid pool at Commerce to assist counties that are obligated to refund legal financial obligations previously paid by defendants whose convictions or sentences were affected by the *State v. Blake* decision.

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- Provides funding to Commerce to reimburse counties for administering refunds related to vacation and resentencing hearings for defendants affected by the *State v. Blake* decision.
- Creates a grant program at Commerce for evidence-based services to youth who are at high risk to perpetrate gun violence and who live in areas with high rates of gun violence.
- Provides funding to the Health Care Authority and local funds to the Department of Health to expand clubhouse services
- Provisos substance abuse prevention and treatment block grant funding for additional resources towards peer support, substance abuse family navigators, and the opioid treatment network.
- Provides funding to the Health Care Authority to implement high intensity programs for homeless outreach stabilization transition teams, a grant to provide psychiatric outreach to the homeless, and funding for mobile opioid treatment programs in unserved areas.
- Provides specific funding for the Department of Corrections to hold virtual hearings and provide release assistance as related to the *State v. Blake* decision.
- Provides funding to the Workforce Training and Education Coordinating Board for a behavioral health workforce advisory committee to monitor and report on the progress of recommendations from the board's previous behavioral health workforce assessments, and continue to develop policy and practice recommendations on emerging issues in the behavioral health workforce. The committee must report and provide recommendations on December 1, 2021 and December 1, 2022.
