Ongoing COVID Restrictions

- Part of state Emergency Operations Center response
- Mask mandate
- Child care issues for rural producers
- Medical patients concerns about accessing product in person following July 31, 2021 allowance termination

- Re-activated certain allowances until Oct. 31
 - Cannabis curbside service
 - Hand sanitizer and mask giveaways by retailers
 - Curbside and walk-up retail windows
 - Minors present on premises of cannabis producer/processors impacted by school and daycare closures

Social Equity

- Social Equity in Cannabis Task Force developing criteria for additional licenses dedicated to those disproportionately harmed by the War on Drugs.
 - Task Force created by 2020 LCB-request legislation (E2SHB 2870)
 - LCB Board Member Ollie Garrett on Task Force
 - LCB staff contribute to but do not staff Task Force

- Held facilitated community meetings in Fall 2020 to hear from communities impacted by the War on Drugs
- Ongoing contributions to Task Force and its sub-committees
- Published Social Equity website for potential applicants
- Hired Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Manager (Oct. 2021)

Hemp-Derived Cannabinoids (Delta 8, Delta 9,...

- Potentially intoxicating, unregulated, untested
- Chemically derived from hemp-derived CBD
- Widely available online and mass-marketed
- Industry divided over how to handle


- National issue with states responding differently
- LCB opened rulemaking in July
- Held "Listen and Learn" session with stakeholders (September)
- Communicated to licensees that D8 and D9 are prohibited in licensed businesses and followed with LCB enforcement/education plan.
- LCB seeking legislation that would clarify our regulatory role over emerging compounds

Uncertainty of Federal Legalization

- Industry concerns over uncertain impact of federal descheduling and/or legalization of cannabis
- Federal action expected within 2-5 years

- Currently providing feedback on draft Cannabis Administration and Opportunity Act
- Transitioning from tight traceability to reporting system (CCRS) in December
- Reviewing/drafting flexible rules where possible
- Working with new organization of state regulators (CANNRA) to share best practices and common voice




2019: E&E emphasis on education and supporting voluntary compliance in cannabis


NTC: Notice to Correct AVN: Administrative Violation Notice

Education Trends



256% increase in educational contacts from 2018 to 2021

Consultation Visits

- Purpose: to offer a route to correct violations without incurring a penalty
 - 16 consultation visits (01 Jan 2021)
- Proactive work done by the Enforcement & Education
 - Officers are visiting business frequently
 - Increased number of educational contacts
 - Notice to Correct option available and successful
 - 95% gain compliance and no further action is needed

Enforcement: Complaints

September 2021

- There were 664 complaints logged with enforcement in the month of September
- There were 18 complaints against the cannabis industry, 600 in liquor, and 46 in tobacco/vapor
- 87% of complaints were COVID-19 related
- There was a 341% increase in complaints from August to September due to COVID-19 restrictions





AVNs Issued




13% of businesses had a repeat violation in the last 12 months (due in part to businesses getting multiple COVID-19 violations)



Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Liquor



Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Cannabis




Liquor Compliance Checks

- Compliance rate for CY2019 85% (Pre COVID-19)



- Compliance rate for CY2019 91% (Pre COVID-19)

Agency Initiatives – The Board

- Board launched penalty rule changes Nov 2018
 - Restructured penalties around violation severity and relationship to public health and safety (rather than five categories of violation)
- Focus on compliance education, lessening severity of penalties
 - Fines cut by half or more
 - Cumulative impact of past violations reduced to 2 years, instead of 3 (Aligns with alcohol rules)
 - Significantly reduced number of violations that could lead to cancellation of license
 - Provided a deferral option
 - Balancing and better aligning penalties across license type
 - Incorporate provisions of SB 5318, such as notice of correction
 - Established Voluntary Consultation and Education Program

Agency Initiatives – Enforcement

- Early 2019, prior to Senate approval of SB 5318, LCB issued RFP seeking enforcement guidance from national experts (Hillard/Heintze report) and licensees
- Implementation completed by early 2021 (report offered 10 key findings, 18 recommendations)
 - Cannabis unit: 50% Officers, 50% Compliance Consultants
 - Compliance consultants do not carry firearms
 - Presentation of staff altered (badges, apparel, etc.)
 - All officer position descriptions revised to emphasize education
 - Training expanded focusing on education, de-escalation
- Investigation of complaints policy revamped, now led by HR, with AG & Union partnership; and H/H guidance

Agency Initiatives - Director's Office

- Re-Organization Forms New Legal and Policy Team
 - Rules, Policy and External Relations focus
 - Expanded rules staff
 - Directed by Justin Nordhorn
- Program started to offer Interpretive and Policy Statements
 - Provides licensees with a one-stop repository of policy statements and interpretations of statute, rule, or both
 - Focuses on consistency to support licensee compliance and success
 - Cross-divisional team examines questions brought by licensees and LCB staff
 - Example project: CBD sales in licensed I-502 stores

Lab Updates

Current Landscape

11 certified marijuana testing labs

- 5 labs have the optional pesticide certification
- 3 labs have the optional heavy metals certification
- 9 of 11 labs are located in Western Washington
- 2 of 11 labs are located in Eastern Washington

Labs complete two rounds of proficiency testing each calendar year and are reviewed annually after their initial certification review.

Lab Updates





Traceability

- Cannabis 2.0 initiative reevaluated approach to regulating the industry
- Requirements for cannabis reporting were evaluated to determine what is absolutely necessary
- LCB staff engaged stakeholders including producers, processers and retailers
- Current traceability system contract expires in June of 2022
- Decision was made to develop an in-house system for reporting only rather than negotiate extension of contract for current system

Cannabis Central Reporting System (CCRS)

- Key Benefits Include:
 - Simpler. Reduces complexity of reporting which reduces margin for error
 - More flexible. Licensees perceive the framework to be more flexible for operational efficiencies; and
 - Potential of lower costs for compliance. Licensees may see a reduction in business and compliance costs.

Cannabis Central Reporting System (CCRS)

Communications:

- Ongoing updates about project being sent to industry listserve
- CCRS page on LCB website includes user guide, file specification manual, test cases, file templates, FAQ
- General and technical webinars have been presented
- System testing by licensees, integrators and labs throughout October
- Projected go live December 2021
