1 On page 1, after line 16, insert the following:

2 "Sec. 2. RCW 69.50.540 and 2021 c 334 s 986 are each amended to 3 read as follows:

The legislature must annually appropriate moneys in the dedicated marijuana account created in RCW 69.50.530 as follows:

6 (1) For the purposes listed in this subsection (1), the 7 legislature must appropriate to the respective agencies amounts 8 sufficient to make the following expenditures on a quarterly basis or 9 as provided in this subsection:

(a) One hundred twenty-five thousand dollars to the health care 10 11 authority to design and administer the Washington state healthy youth 12 survey, analyze the collected data, and produce reports, in 13 collaboration with the office of the superintendent of public 14 instruction, department of health, department of commerce, family 15 policy council, and board. The survey must be conducted at least 16 every two years and include questions regarding, but not necessarily 17 limited to, academic achievement, age at time of substance use initiation, antisocial behavior of friends, 18 attitudes toward 19 antisocial behavior, attitudes toward substance use, laws and 20 community norms regarding antisocial behavior, family conflict, 21 family management, parental attitudes toward substance use, peer 22 rewarding of antisocial behavior, perceived risk of substance use, 23 and rebelliousness. Funds disbursed under this subsection may be used 24 to expand administration of the healthy youth survey to student 25 populations attending institutions of higher education in Washington;

(b) Fifty thousand dollars to the health care authority for the purpose of contracting with the Washington state institute for public policy to conduct the cost-benefit evaluation and produce the reports described in RCW 69.50.550. This appropriation ends after production of the final report required by RCW 69.50.550;

1 (c) Five thousand dollars to the University of Washington alcohol 2 and drug abuse institute for the creation, maintenance, and timely 3 updating of web-based public education materials providing medically 4 and scientifically accurate information about the health and safety 5 risks posed by marijuana use;

6 (d)(i) An amount not less than one million two hundred fifty 7 thousand dollars to the board for administration of this chapter as 8 appropriated in the omnibus appropriations act;

9 (ii) One million three hundred twenty-three thousand dollars for 10 fiscal year 2020 to the health professions account established under 11 RCW 43.70.320 for the development and administration of the marijuana 12 authorization database by the department of health;

(iii) Two million four hundred fifty-three thousand dollars for fiscal year 2020 and two million four hundred twenty-three thousand dollars for fiscal years 2021, 2022, and 2023 to the Washington state patrol for a drug enforcement task force. It is the intent of the legislature that this policy will be continued in the 2021-2023 fiscal biennium; and

19 (iv) Ninety-eight thousand dollars for fiscal year 2019 to the 20 department of ecology for research on accreditation of marijuana 21 product testing laboratories;

(e) Four hundred sixty-five thousand dollars for fiscal year 22 (e) Four hundred sixty-four thousand dollars for fiscal year 2021, 23 two hundred seventy thousand dollars in fiscal year 2022, and two 24 hundred seventy-six thousand dollars in fiscal year 2022, and two 25 hundred seventy-six thousand dollars in fiscal year 2023 to the 26 department of ecology for implementation of accreditation of 27 marijuana product testing laboratories;

(f) One hundred eighty-nine thousand dollars for fiscal year 2020 to the department of health for rule making regarding compassionate care renewals;

31 (g) Eight hundred eight thousand dollars for each of fiscal years 32 2020 through 2023 to the department of health for the administration 33 of the marijuana authorization database;

(h) Six hundred thirty-five thousand dollars for fiscal year 2020, six hundred thirty-five thousand dollars for fiscal year 2021, six hundred twenty-one thousand dollars for fiscal year 2022, and six hundred twenty-seven thousand dollars for fiscal year 2023 to the department of agriculture for compliance-based laboratory analysis of pesticides in marijuana;

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1 (i) One million six hundred fifty thousand dollars for fiscal 2 year 2022 and one million six hundred fifty thousand dollars for 3 fiscal year 2023 to the department of commerce to fund the 4 ((marijuana)) <u>cannabis</u> social equity technical assistance 5 ((competitive)) grant program under RCW 43.330.540; ((and))

6 (j) One hundred sixty-three thousand dollars for fiscal year 2022 7 and one hundred fifty-nine thousand dollars for fiscal year 2023 to 8 the department of commerce to establish a roster of mentors as part 9 of the cannabis social equity technical assistance grant program 10 under Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1443 (cannabis industry/ 11 equity) (([chapter 169, Laws of 2021])) <u>chapter 169, Laws of 2021</u>; 12 and

13 (k) \$150,000 for fiscal year 2023 to the board to conduct a study 14 to determine if the statewide limit of retail outlets on the 15 effective date of this section is sufficient to meet the consumption 16 rate and population of the state as well as the legislature's social 17 equity goals; and

18 (2) From the amounts in the dedicated marijuana account after 19 appropriation of the amounts identified in subsection (1) of this 20 section, the legislature must appropriate for the purposes listed in 21 this subsection (2) as follows:

22 (a) (i) Up to fifteen percent to the health care authority for the 23 development, implementation, maintenance, and evaluation of programs and practices aimed at the prevention or reduction of maladaptive 24 25 substance use, substance use disorder, substance abuse or substance 26 dependence, as these terms are defined in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, among middle school and high 27 28 school-age students, whether as an explicit goal of a given program or practice or as a consistently corresponding effect of its 29 implementation, mental health services for children and youth, and 30 31 services for pregnant and parenting women; PROVIDED, That:

32 (A) Of the funds appropriated under (a)(i) of this subsection for 33 new programs and new services, at least eighty-five percent must be 34 directed to evidence-based or research-based programs and practices 35 that produce objectively measurable results and, by September 1, 36 2020, are cost-beneficial; and

37 (B) Up to fifteen percent of the funds appropriated under (a)(i) 38 of this subsection for new programs and new services may be directed 39 to proven and tested practices, emerging best practices, or promising 40 practices.

1 (ii) In deciding which programs and practices to fund, the 2 director of the health care authority must consult, at least 3 annually, with the University of Washington's social development 4 research group and the University of Washington's alcohol and drug 5 abuse institute.

6 (iii) For each fiscal year, the legislature must appropriate a 7 minimum of twenty-five million five hundred thirty-six thousand 8 dollars under this subsection (2)(a);

9 (b)(i) Up to ten percent to the department of health for the 10 following, subject to (b)(ii) of this subsection (2):

11 (A) Creation, implementation, operation, and management of a 12 marijuana education and public health program that contains the 13 following:

(I) A marijuana use public health hotline that provides referrals to substance abuse treatment providers, utilizes evidence-based or research-based public health approaches to minimizing the harms associated with marijuana use, and does not solely advocate an abstinence-only approach;

(II) A grants program for local health departments or other local community agencies that supports development and implementation of coordinated intervention strategies for the prevention and reduction of marijuana use by youth; and

(III) Media-based education campaigns across television, internet, radio, print, and out-of-home advertising, separately targeting youth and adults, that provide medically and scientifically accurate information about the health and safety risks posed by marijuana use; and

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(B) The Washington poison control center.

(ii) For each fiscal year, the legislature must appropriate a minimum of nine million seven hundred fifty thousand dollars under this subsection (2)(b);

32 (c)(i) Up to six-tenths of one percent to the University of 33 Washington and four-tenths of one percent to Washington State 34 University for research on the short and long-term effects of 35 marijuana use, to include but not be limited to formal and informal 36 methods for estimating and measuring intoxication and impairment, and 37 for the dissemination of such research.

38 (ii) For each fiscal year, except for the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 39 fiscal biennia, the legislature must appropriate a minimum of one 40 million twenty-one thousand dollars to the University of Washington. Code Rev/KB:jlb 4 H-2901.1/22

For each fiscal year, except for the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 fiscal 1 biennia, the legislature must appropriate a minimum of six hundred 2 eighty-one thousand dollars to Washington State University under this 3 subsection (2)(c). It is the intent of the legislature that this 4 policy will be continued in the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium; 5

6 (d) Fifty percent to the state basic health plan trust account to 7 be administered by the Washington basic health plan administrator and used as provided under chapter 70.47 RCW; 8

(e) Five percent to the Washington state health care authority to 9 be expended exclusively through contracts with community health 10 11 centers to provide primary health and dental care services, migrant 12 health services, and maternity health care services as provided under RCW 41.05.220; 13

(f) (i) Up to three-tenths of one percent to the office of the 14 superintendent of public instruction to fund grants to building 15 16 bridges programs under chapter 28A.175 RCW.

17 (ii) For each fiscal year, the legislature must appropriate a minimum of five hundred eleven thousand dollars to the office of the 18 19 superintendent of public instruction under this subsection (2)(f); 20 and

21 (g) At the end of each fiscal year, the treasurer must transfer any amounts in the dedicated marijuana account that are not 22 appropriated pursuant to subsection (1) of this section and this 23 24 subsection (2) into the general fund, except as provided in (g)(i) of 25 this subsection (2).

26 (i) Beginning in fiscal year 2018, if marijuana excise tax collections deposited into the general fund in the prior fiscal year 27 exceed twenty-five million dollars, then each fiscal year the 28 29 legislature must appropriate an amount equal to thirty percent of all marijuana excise taxes deposited into the general fund the prior 30 31 fiscal year to the treasurer for distribution to counties, cities, 32 and towns as follows:

(A) Thirty percent must be distributed to counties, cities, and 33 towns where licensed marijuana retailers are physically located. Each 34 jurisdiction must receive a share of the revenue distribution under 35 36 this subsection (2)(g)(i)(A) based on the proportional share of the total revenues generated in the individual jurisdiction from the 37 taxes collected under RCW 69.50.535, from licensed marijuana 38 retailers physically located in each jurisdiction. 1 amount attributed to a retailer physically located in a city or town 2 must be distributed to the city or town.

3 (B) Seventy percent must be distributed to counties, cities, and 4 towns ratably on a per capita basis. Counties must receive sixty 5 percent of the distribution, which must be disbursed based on each 6 county's total proportional population. Funds may only be distributed 7 to jurisdictions that do not prohibit the siting of any state 8 licensed marijuana producer, processor, or retailer.

9 (ii) Distribution amounts allocated to each county, city, and 10 town must be distributed in four installments by the last day of each 11 fiscal quarter.

(iii) By September 15th of each year, the board must provide the state treasurer the annual distribution amount, if any, for each county and city as determined in (g)(i) of this subsection (2).

(iv) The total share of marijuana excise tax revenues distributed to counties and cities in (g)(i) of this subsection (2) may not exceed fifteen million dollars in fiscal years 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021, and twenty million dollars per fiscal year thereafter.

19 Sec. 3. RCW 69.50.354 and 2015 c 70 s 9 are each amended to read 20 as follows:

21 ((There)) (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this 22 section, there may be licensed, in no greater number in each of the counties of the state than as the ((state liquor and cannabis)) board 23 24 shall deem advisable, retail outlets established for the purpose of making marijuana concentrates, useable marijuana, and marijuana-25 infused products available for sale to adults aged twenty-one and 26 27 over. Retail sale of marijuana concentrates, useable marijuana, and 28 marijuana-infused products in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and the rules adopted to implement and enforce it, by a 29 30 validly licensed marijuana retailer or retail outlet employee, shall 31 not be a criminal or civil offense under Washington state law.

32 (2) If the board determines that an increase in the number of 33 retail outlet licenses in existence on January 1, 2020, is necessary, 34 the board must submit its recommendation to the legislature for 35 approval by the legislature."

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<u>EFFECT:</u> Directs an appropriation of \$150,000 for Fiscal Year 2023 from the Dedicated Marijuana Account to the Liquor and Cannabis Board (LCB) to conduct a study to determine if the statewide limit of cannabis retail outlets on the effective date of the bill is sufficient to meet the consumption rate and population of the state as well as the Legislature's social equity goals. Specifies that if the LCB determines that an increase in the number of cannabis retail outlet licenses in existence on January 1, 2020, is necessary, the LCB must submit its recommendation to the Legislature for approval.

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
