





Washington Traffic Fatalities

*PRELIMINARY: WA Monthly Fatal Crash Counts as of 01/03/2023










INCREASES IN FATALITIES HAVE BEEN DISPROPORTIONATE






ALCOHOL IMPAIRMENT





Alcohol Impairment in WA Traffic Fatalities








COMPARING FATALITIES AND TRAFFIC CITATION TRENDS BY YEAR, 2019-21




DRIVER EDUCATION AND EXPERIENCE

- 18–25-year-old drivers who have not had driver education had 70% higher injury and fatal crash rates
- More than half wait or plan to wait until 18+ to avoid the driver training requirement due to cost
- Consequently, only 45% of drivers 16-25 have completed driver education (DOL, 2016-21)



Crash Rates per 1,000 Licensed Drivers, 2016-2020 (Drivers Licensed at 16-17 required to complete driver training course)



A PERFECT STORM

- Our current system does not require driver education or structured supervision (Intermediate License) past the age of 17
- Due to the added expense, many young drivers have to wait or choose to wait to obtain a license (disproportionately low income, Black, and Hispanic drivers)
- Consequently, new drivers at ages 18-21 experience the highest rates of injury and fatal crash involvement
