Budget challenges and priorities

Challenges

- Revenue growth slowing
- Caseloads/enrollments increasing
- Inflation driving up costs
- Maintaining and retaining skilled state workforce

Budget principles

- Maintain existing services
- Maintain agencies' ability to function
- End programs that no longer needed
- Reduce where conditions or needs have changed
- Delay implementation of programs

Investments and reductions - Opioids and behavioral health

Increases

- Supports Tribes with opioid prevention and treatment
- Expands emergency departments' access to medication for opioid use disorder
- Increases opioid use disorder treatment and education at juvenile rehabilitation facilities
- Adds community setting supports for transition from behavioral health inpatient settings
- Implements the fourth phase of the Trueblood v. DSHS settlement agreement
- Funds UW Behavioral Health Hospital increase to 75 long term civil commitment beds

- Delays Maple Lane expansion
- Reduces Olympic Heritage Behavioral Health funding based on actual expenditures



Investments – Housing and homelessness

- Backfills the document recording fee
- Continues Consolidated Homeless Grants
- Continues housing services for youth through temporary residence, basic needs family reconciliation and rental assistance
- Continues funding for operating and maintenance of permanent supportive affordable housing units
- Maintains the Foreclosure Fairness Program
- Continues grants for streamlining the local permit process
- Aids refugees and immigrants who do not qualify for federal refugee resettlement services



Investments and reductions - Early learning and child care

Increases

- Increases ECEAP provider rates
- Adds 750 ECEAP school day slots (July 2026)
- Provides grants to blend ECEAP and Transition to Kindergarten (TTK) classrooms
- Increases WCCC provider rates to 85th percentile
- Complies with child care federal rules

- Delays ECEAP entitlement to 2030-31 school year
- Removes unfilled ECEAP part-day slots
- Maintains WCCC eligibility at current level and delays expansion to 75% state median Income



Investments and reductions - K-12 and higher education

Increases

- Continues student nutrition
- Assists school districts with financial management
- Updates apportionment system
- Increases K-12 compensation
- Retains Washington College Grant up to 65% state median income
- Supports the UW Behavioral Health Teaching Facility

- Pauses the National Board certification bonus
- Various K-12 grants



Investments - Maintaining and retaining a skilled state workforce

- Funds collective bargaining agreements
- Includes 3% and 2% general wage increases for most state employees
- Maintains health care premiums at 85% / 15%
- Provides competitive pay for low-income workers
- Targets wage increases to address retention and recruitment
- Provides premium pay for hard-to-fill positions



Investments and reductions – Human services

Increases

- Senior nutrition program and food assistance at community food banks and pantries
- Community residential services for people with developmental disabilities
- Support for Tribal facilities that provide health care services for Medicaid clients
- Criminal justice training academy expansion for local correctional officers
- Stafford Creek Corrections Center juvenile rehabilitation center

- Closing Rainier and Yakima Valley School residential habilitation centers
- Closing Mission Creek Corrections Center for Women
- Closing reentry centers: Ahtanum View and Bellingham
- Closing a unit at Special Commitment Center
- Staffing vacancy reductions



Investments and reductions – Climate change

Increases

- Invests additional \$80 million in Climate Commitment Act revenues in operating budget
- Advances environmental justice and the HEAL Act
- Continues incentives for electric vehicles
- Builds climate resiliency
- Maximizes the transmission of clean energy and clean energy development

Reductions

Reduces base budget funding across eight agencies and over a dozen programs by \$45 million
