AN ACT Relating to designating certain communities as additional timber impact areas; amending RCW 50.70.010, 43.31.601, 43.160.020, 43.20A.750, 28B.80.570, and 70.47.115; amending 1991 c 314 s 26 (uncodified); reenacting and amending RCW 28B.50.030; and declaring an emergency.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 Sec. 1. RCW 50.70.010 and 1991 c 315 s 5 are each amended to read 8 as follows:

9 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 10 this section apply throughout this chapter.

11 (1) "Department" means the employment security department.

12 (2) "Dislocated forest products worker" means a forest products 13 worker who: (a)(i) Has been terminated or received notice of 14 termination from employment and is unlikely to return to employment in

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the individual's principal occupation or previous industry because of 1 2 a diminishing demand for his or her skills in that occupation or 3 industry; or (ii) is self-employed and has been displaced from his or 4 her business because of the diminishing demand for the business's services or goods; and (b) at the time of last separation from 5 б employment, resided in or was employed in a timber impact area.

7 (3) "Forest products worker" means a worker in the forest products industries affected by the reduction of forest fiber enhancement, 8 9 transportation, or production. The workers included within this 10 definition shall be determined by the employment security department, but shall include workers employed in the industries assigned the major 11 group standard industrial classification codes "24" and "26" and the 12 13 industries involved in the harvesting and management of logs, 14 transportation of logs and wood products, processing of wood products, and the manufacturing and distribution of wood processing and logging 15 equipment. The commissioner may adopt rules further interpreting these 16 17 definitions. For the purposes of this subsection, "standard industrial classification code" means the code identified in RCW 50.29.025(6)(c). 18 19 (4) "Program" means the employment and career orientation program 20 for dislocated forest products workers administered by the employment

security department in conjunction with the department of natural 21 22 resources.

23 (5) "Enrollee" means any person enrolled in the program.

(6) "Project" means the natural resource worker project.

(1) The department of social and health services shall help 3 4 families and workers in timber impact areas make the transition through 5 economic difficulties and shall provide services to assist workers to б gain marketable skills. The department, as a member of the agency timber task force and in consultation with the economic recovery 7 coordination board, and, where appropriate, under an interagency 8 9 agreement with the department of community development, shall provide grants through the office of the secretary for services to the 10 unemployed in timber impact areas, including providing direct or 11 referral services, establishing and operating service delivery 12 programs, and coordinating delivery programs and delivery of services. 13 14 These grants may be awarded for family support centers, reemployment centers, or other local service agencies. 15

16 (2) The services provided through the grants may include, but need 17 not be limited to: Credit counseling; social services including 18 marital counseling; psychotherapy or psychological counseling; mortgage 19 foreclosures and utilities problems counseling; drug and alcohol abuse 20 services; medical services; and residential heating and food 21 acquisition.

As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise, the term:

labor. For purposes of this chapter, technical colleges shall include

9 Sec. 8. 1991 c 314 s 26 (uncodified) is amended to read as 10 follows:

(1) For the period beginning July 1, 1991, and ending June 30, 12 1993, in timber impact areas the public works board may award low-13 interest or interest-free loans to local governments for construction 14 of new public works facilities that stimulate economic growth or 15 diversification.

16 (2) For the purposes of this section and section 27 ((of this 17 act)), chapter 314, Laws of 1991:

18 (a) "Public facilities" means bridge, road and street, domestic
19 water, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer systems.

20 (b) "Timber impact area" means:

five hundred thousand must have direct lumber and wood products job 1 2 losses of one thousand positions or more; or (((iii))) (C) an annual unemployment rate twenty percent or more above the state average; or 3 (ii) Additional communities as the economic recovery coordinating 4 board, established in RCW 43.31.631, designates based on a finding by 5 6 the board that each designated community is socially and economically 7 integrated with areas that meet the definition of a timber impact area under (b)(i) of this subsection. 8

9 (3) The loans may have a deferred payment of up to five years but 10 shall be repaid within twenty years. The public works board may 11 require other terms and conditions and may charge such rates of 12 interest on its loans as it deems appropriate to carry out the purposes 13 of this section. Repayments shall be made to the public works 14 assistance account.

(4) The board may make such loans irrespective of the annual loancycle and reporting required in RCW 43.155.070.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 9.** This act is necessary for the immediate 18 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 19 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 20 effect immediately.

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
